GCSE Sheffield Manor History Visit

As a part of History GCSE, the Year 11 History students took part in a school trip to Sheffield Manor Lodge, the property of the 6th Earl of Shrewsbury, George Talbot, who had custody of Mary Queen of Scots, from 1569-1584, following her arrest by Queen Elizabeth in 1568.

We took part in many activities once we'd arrived at the Lodge. We attempted to recreate and mould the Manor out of clay, studying the structure and layout of the manor, and referencing familiar Tudor architecture, relevant to our GCSE course. We were also looking at and translating old Tudor texts, writing them out using quills and ink. This was interesting as we could look at some of the traditional Tudor language that was used, and how the language has evolved over time.

As we went on to learn about the rich history of The Lodge, we studied its relation to Mary Queen of Scots and Elizabeth the 1st. While visiting the Tower House, we learnt about Elizabethan lifestyle, including information about dining traditions, habits, and rules widely practised in the Tudor period.

Studying the different important figures involved with the Lodge, was also part of our trip. These included George Talbot, the owner of the Lodge, his story of accommodating Mary Queen of Scots, and how it led to his eventual bankruptcy. We also studied the story of his wife, Bess of Hardwick, and her friendship, and rivalry, with Mary, including scandal and plots against Elizabeth 1st. Whilst also in the Tower, we got to dress up, trying on many traditional Tudor/Elizabethan outfits, including elegant ballgowns, doublets, capes, and Tudor headwear. This, as well as being a lot of fun, was helpful to us, as we study Tudor fashion as part of our History course.

Overall, we got to study many different elements of Elizabethan history and daily life, along with studying the Monarchs and their scandals, all whilst exploring the ruins of a real Tudor building.

Year 11 Arrows Programme Trip to University of Cambridge

On Thursday 6 October, 10 of the members from the Year 11 Arrows Programme took part in a trip to Pembroke College, in Cambridge. The trip started with an icebreaker challenge, involving Cambridge trivia, university knowledge, and teamwork with three other schools.

We were then given an introduction to the University of Cambridge, including its different college campuses, variety of courses, and enrolment process, involving information on the requirements for application, and tips for student interviews. The trip then proceeded onto a Q and A session with current students across a range of different subject areas, we were able to ask them about their decision-making process, their courses, the extracurricular opportunities available to them, and the different leadership roles they had, within the student body.

We were then taken on a tour of the campus, visiting the available student areas, different types of student accommodations, and the campus chapel, with the tour culminating in the hall, where we ate lunch, and chatted to the student tour guide.

Returning to our meeting room, we received a taster lecture, from a 3rd year PhD student, presenting her project on Poisons vs Medicines, in which we learnt many new things about different areas of science, and about her research taking place at the university, as part of her Natural Sciences Course.

Finally, we discussed post 16 choices, and the subject requirements for different areas of education, the specific courses available within, and the A level options required to partake in those courses. We thoroughly enjoyed our day out in Cambridge, and took part in many, University based, learning activities and opportunities throughout the trip.

Year 12 & 13 Visit to Cummins Power Systems

Whilst most of the school had a day off at home last Friday due to the teacher training day, a few of us were embarking on an exciting opportunity to explore the world of Cummins, a multi-national engineering firm who specialise in the production of high-volume engines for power generation.

Upon arrival, it was obvious that Cummins was a massive company: from the size of the site we visited in Daventry that was around forty thousand square metres to the employees numbered at around one thousand people. We were ushered through a row of office cubicles to the meeting room which became our home for the day. Once settled – and after we had selected our snacks and drinks – we were introduced to the world of Cummins with a fascinating presentation detailing the role of the company in the wider world. We learnt that virtually all hospitals in the UK as well as many other massive projects such as the Olympic Park use Cummins generators as backup power.

In our groups, we went to learn about the use of virtual reality in the engineering world and have a go ourselves. One-by-one we all had a go at viewing the inside of an engine and performing virtual maintenance using the state-of-the-art VR technology. This was a real privilege and one of the highlights of the day.

Next up was a tour of the factory in which we not only learnt about the order in which the engine is manufactured but also the extreme, but necessary precautions taken to ensure that every engine is produced perfectly with no defects. I was mind-boggled when I saw the vision scanner used to ensure that even the smallest gasket is perfectly fitted.

After lunch, we were shown how the production process is being modified using Cobots (collaborative robots) who can support a worker in the production of a part of the engine and lead to a higher quality product. A part of this involved us playing with these robots which was another highlight of the day.

After this, we were shown a brief presentation on the apprenticeship opportunities which is certainly worth looking into especially for Year 11's. Then we got back on the bus and spent the journey home digesting the day's events.

We would all like to say a huge thank you to everyone at Cummins for having us and specially to Harry Haslam for organising the visit and ensuring everyone had a good day.

Transport & Lost Property

Buses

Many of our services are now near full capacity, the council are aware of this. This means that students will not have a choice of seat and will need to sit where there is availability. We also need students to be more considerate and not place bags etc on seats, not allowing others to use them. Students **MUST ONLY** use the bus they are assigned to as this is causing overcrowding issues.

- Students must have their bus pass with them at **ALL** times and show the driver on boarding the bus.
- If your child has lost or forgotten their bus pass, they must obtain a temporary pass.
- Temporary Bus Passes can be obtained only during **BREAK** and **LUNCH** from Student Reception.
- Passes cannot be obtained at the end of the day as there is insufficient time to issue the pass without the possibility that they may miss the bus.
- Permanent bus pass replacements are obtained through the council websites at a cost of £25.
- Students are issued a pass for **ONE** specific route. This is to ensure student safety by loading the vehicles to agreed levels. In the event of a breakdown/accident we need to be sure which students are on the vehicle.
- Students are not able to travel on a bus which they are not assigned to.
- Passes **MUST NOT** be given to a student not named on them.
- Any damage on a bus will be charged to the parent/carer of the student.
- If you wish to transfer to a different bus this can only be arranged by the Council.

SAFETY MATTERS: The Halloween and Bonfire Night edition



Don't let fire creep up on you this Halloween

Candles and flames

Candles can be popular for use in pumpkins and homes at Halloween, but unfortunately, candles also cause many fires and can be a hazard to families and properties. Opt for artificial candles instead. They are safer and also emit the same glow for those creepy decorations.



Bonfires - the safe way

Fireworks may often be the main feature of a seasonal display, but bonfires are also a major attraction.

- Before lighting a bonfire, always check the structure is sound and there are no small children or animals hiding inside
- Position a bonfire away from sheds, fences and trees to avoid flames spreading
- Never use petrol or paraffin to light a fire. A safer way is to use paper and solid firelighters in two or three places to ensure an even burn
- Never burn dangerous rubbish such as foam-filled furniture, rubber, aerosols, tins
 of paint, pressurised gas cylinders, tyres and bottles
- Have one person responsible for lighting the fire. That person, and any helpers, should wear suitable clothing such as a substantial outer garment made of wool or other low flammable material and strong boots or shoes
- Never leave a bonfire unattended
