





September


Selected Eco-committee and carried out Environmental review. Students chose a committee Chair (Connie) and leads for the group (our 6th Formers, Jemima and Emma).



Environmental review and chosen themes.
Initially we chose Energy, but this involved too much work with site and there was no Site
Manager around at the time. We chose, Global
Citizenship, School grounds and Litter.
Students supported at the first Green Welford
Kidsfest event.

November

Gathered information from School Business Manager, accounts and site about the energy use around the Academy. Talked about creating a green roof. After initial investigations we realised that as students it would be difficult to move on this.







December

Christmas themed Bake sale focus to support 'Trees for Station Road' in Long Buckby.
Students created posters which went on social media and around the site (we then decided putting up posters is not very sustainable).
Raised approximately £221 from the bake sale which would be sent to them.

January

Term focus on 'School Grounds' through the collection of indoor plants from various sources. Students then decided to create their own post from old plastic bottles to recycle. Students started to bring in spider plants and reproduce their own plants. Students asked the Principal about having a non-unform day later in the year (agreed). Contact DPD and the School Business Manager about the purchase of coloured bins in house colours to encourage students to put litter in the bin and recycle.









February

10th February, Green Non-uniform day to raise money for Global Citizenship, eco charities - £880 raised. Liaise regarding bins. Messages to staff about use of correct recycling for paper outside classrooms. Distribution of plants. Students put notes through doors in their village, whilst others went to Dobbies to obtain pots for the indoor plants. Mrs Commons visiting Gambia in February half term to deliver medical aid to Penyem Village.






An Eco-committee Year
