Activities

Guidance:

- Have the following for submission in your first Psychology lesson. This must be your own work. Take pride in the quality of the finished product.
- You will not be able to do all this work in one or two sessions. Spend a good amount of time on this over several sessions. As a guide, it should be **at least 8 hours of work**, but significantly more than this if you want to make a great start in this course.
- Do not just 'blind copy' the answers; you need to understand what you are writing.
- Revise the content thoroughly after completion, as you will be assessed on it in the first lesson of psychology. Test yourself on your understanding!

- 1. Read page 10 of the online textbook carefully. (Note: page 10 to 11 will be on the same screen. You can zoom in on any section use the + on the bottom right)
- a. **Write** (at least) a paragraph summary of the **biological approach to psychology**. Include the causes of human behaviour it focuses on and the methods is uses to investigate human behaviour.
- b. Now write the same for the behavioural approach to psychology, with the same structure.

Optional extension: note down any **key differences** between these two approaches, in terms of their key assumptions (beliefs about human behaviour): for this you can research and refer to the 'nature nurture' debate. How do their methods of investigating human behaviour compare?

- 2. Read page 11 of the online textbook carefully, then for each of the following, write at least 2 sentences.
- a. What does the iceberg represent in the psychodynamic approach?
- b. What are the key beliefs of the **humanistic approach**?

For the following write at least a paragraph:

- c. Write a summary of the **cognitive approach**. What does it focus on when studying humans? How does it explain mental disorders, such as depression? What methods does it use to investigate human behaviour?
- 3. **Research Methods in Psychology.** Read pages 8-9 of the online textbook (**Extension:** you can also use other sections of the textbook for this task; use the contents section to find relevant pages). Write a short essay titled '**Research Methods in Psychology**'.

Guidance:

- Avoid the writing in the 'first person', this simply means do not use words "I" or "Me".
- Avoid overly long sentences (keep them nice and 'concise').
- Do not write things down that you do not understand; spend time trying to digest the information before writing. Extend your vocabulary by looking up unfamiliar words!

Suggested structure:

- The different methods used in Psychology. The problems with each method.
- Some of the 'ethical issues' in psychological research.
- How results are analysed.

Extension: What is meant by **validity** in psychology? What are the different types? Why is validity important in research?

- **4. REQUIRED.** Contact someone who has studied or is studying A level Psychology. Ask them about the following, then write it up (you could even conduct a structured interview on a video call, e.g. 'Zoom', and this will be your first piece of psychological research (a) do not use their name in your write up though!).
 - A. What have they found interesting/enjoyable about Psychology?
 - B. **More importantly:** what are the main challenges of the course?
 - C. If they could go back in time, what advice would they give themselves at the start of the course?
- **5. Further optional extension tasks:** Research one or more of the following famous studies in psychology and make brief summary notes:
- 1. Zimbardo's prison study 2. The case of Henry Molaison (also known simply as 'HM')
- 3. The case of Genie 4. The case of Phineas Gage 5. Harlow's Monkeys 6. Little Albert
